French director Aurelien Bory returns to BAM with *Plexus*, a dance-physical theater piece for dancer Kaori Ito, Nov 9—13

An intimate tango between a woman and thousands of strings that support and constrain her

Oct 3, 2016/Brooklyn, NY—French theater director Aurélien Bory and Japanese dancer Kaori Ito come together for *Plexus*, a genre-busting piece in which a woman's movement is both supported and restrained by her surroundings.

Bory has wowed BAM audiences twice before with his imaginative interplay of performers and stage sets. In *Les sept planches de la ruse* (2008 Next Wave), it was a mysterious panorama of acrobats scaling giant geometric-shaped boards; in *Sans Objet* (2012 Next Wave), it was a sometimes funny, sometime scary, and eventually delightful play between two humans and a giant industrial robot. With *Plexus* (Latin for "intertwining"), he creates more awe-inspiring scenography. About 5700 black nylon strings are strung vertically in a cube (18 feet on each side). Ito, a frequent collaborator with James Thierrée and Angelin Preljocaj, threads her body into this three-dimensional loom and moves in every direction, sometimes hanging upside down or perpendicular to the stage as if floating in a downpour. Arno Veyrat's perception-altering lighting animates the set with dancing sparkles.

In commenting on his stagecraft, Bory said, "the stage is a space. It can be defined as the rectangular box and the volume of air in between. Both bodies and objects are inescapably subjected to gravity. My purpose is to summon the means of the body and the staging, whatever they may be, to illuminate this quandary." With *Plexus*, he demonstrates that limitation while creating the illusion of defying it.

About the Artists

Aurélien Bory is the founder of Compagnie 111 which is based in Toulouse, France. He develops shows that cross genre lines in the performing arts (theater, circus, dance, visual arts, music). He first drew international attention with *Plan B* (2003) and *Plus ou moins l'infini* (2005), both collaborations with Phil Soltanoff. He has since created *Azimut* (2013 at Grand Théâtre de Provence in Aix-en-Provence), *Plexus* (2012, Théâtre Vidy-Lausanne), *Géométrie de caoutchouc* (2011, Le Grand T, Nantes), and *Sans objet* (2009, Théâtre national de Toulouse Midi-Pyrénées). In 2007 he created *Les sept planches de la ruse* with artists from Dalian, China. With a deep love for dance, Bory also collaborated with Pierre Rigal in *Erection* (2003) and *Arrêts de jeu* (2006). He conceived two portraits of women: *Questcequetudeviens?* for the flamenco dancer Stéphanie Fuster (2008) and *Plexus* for the Japanese dancer Kaori Ito in 2012.

Bory's aesthetic is inspired by his interest in science. His works are driven by the exploration of space and ingenious creation of scenography. Bory received the Créateur sans frontiers (Creator without borders) trophy in 2008. *Questcequetudeviens?* was nominated for the "best new dance production" of the Olivier Awards in 2014. He received the International Applause Joan German Schroeder of FAD Sebastià Gasch Awards in Barcelona for *Plexus*.

Kaori Ito is a dancer, choreographer, and film artist. Born in Tokyo and now based in France, she started studying classical ballet when she was five years old. In 2000, she moved to New York and trained with Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater. From 2003 to 2005, she danced for Philippe Découflé and Angelin Preljocaj. She made her BAM debut in James Thierrée's *Au revoir parapluie* in 2007. She started to choreograph in 2008 and has created several works, including *Asobi*, produced by Ballets C de la B in Belgium.
