André Leon Talley

A uniquely positioned observer, critic, and participant in the spheres of art and culture, Talley inspires audiences with tales of his extraordinary life and career. Talley was born in the segregated South. At the age of 16, he announced that he wanted to be a magazine editor. The odds were against a young black man from North Carolina in the 1960s, but he went on to earn his bachelor's degree at North Carolina Central University and a master's degree in French at Brown. In New York, he interned for Diana Vreeland, who introduced him to Andy Warhol. He worked as an editor for Warhol's *Interview* magazine, then as a fashion editor for *Women's Wear Daily* and, eventually, as the Paris bureau chief for both *WWD* and *W*. In 1983, Talley became a writer for *Vogue*, and five years later was named creative director of the magazine, penning monthly columns, frequent features, and interviews—including the celebrated cover story on First Lady Michelle Obama in 2009.

Tamron Hall

Award-winning journalist Tamron Hall is the host of *Deadline: Crime with Tamron Hall* on Investigation Discovery and formerly the co-host of the third hour of NBC News' *TODAY* and the anchor of MSNBC *Live with Tamron Hall*. She received the 2015 Edward R. Murrow Award for her segment on domestic violence as part of *TODAY*'s Shine A Light series and has hosted several special reports for MSNBC and NBC News. Hall is a native of Luling, Texas.

Danny Glover

Actor, producer and humanitarian Danny Glover has been a commanding presence on screen, stage and television for more than 30 years. Glover is respected for his wide-reaching community activism and philanthropic efforts, with a particular emphasis on advocacy for economic justice, and access to health care and education programs in the United States, Latin America, the Caribbean and Africa. He has served as a Goodwill Ambassador for the United Nations Development Program, focusing on issues of poverty, disease and economic development. He currently serves as UNICEF Ambassador and Ambassador for the United Nations International Decade for People of African Descent. Through his outspoken championing of causes ranging from economic justice to health care to education, Glover not only compels audiences to think about these issues as it pertains to their own choices in their everyday lives—he also urges them toward action.

BAM Howard Gilman Opera House, BAM Rose Cinemas, and BAMcafé are located in the Peter Jay Sharp building at 30 Lafayette Avenue (between St Felix Street and Ashland Place) in the Fort Greene neighborhood of Brooklyn. BAM Harvey Theater is located two blocks from the main building at 651 Fulton Street (between Ashland and Rockwell Places). Both locations house Greenlight Bookstore at BAM kiosks.
